### Task Force: Capstone

#### Task Force: Capstone Report

#### **Justification**

The reason for the disparate categories of Capstone and Synthesis seems no longer necessary and can be quite confusing for faculty submitting courses. A review of several other institutes indicated that a single category is the common approach. Combining out categories into an overarching Culminating Experience still captures the intent of both Core categories and is inclusive of all disciplines.

#### Recommendations

- Merge Capstone and Synthesis into one Mason Core category Culminating Experience.
- •Allow LAUs to define the amount intra- and interdisciplinary skills required/involved/integrated in their zenith course.
- Grandfather all Synthesis and Capstone course into this new category.
- •New courses in this category will be at the 400 level (at least 3 credits), ideally taken after 85 credits, and the capacity is limited to 30 students. (Note: Capstones were restricted to 4xx while Synthesis was allowed to be 3xx and 4xx.)

#### Task Force: Capstone Report

#### **Proposed Definition: Culminating Experience (Zenith)**

The purpose of the culminating experience is to provide a high impact, culminating element of an undergraduate education, to develop a more comprehensive, and integrative understanding across the Mason undergraduate experience, and to utilize critical thinking skills. Culminating experience courses provide students opportunities to apply and communicate their knowledge and generally involve integrative, applied, and experiential projects. Students in a culminating experience course are to be assessed using a set of identified learning outcomes.

#### **Proposed LEARNING OUTCOMES**

- Compose (create?) appropriate and effective communications in field-appropriate modalities. Communicate
  effectively and with awareness of audience, purpose, and context in modalities appropriate to the field (e.g.,
  written, oral, visual, material, embodied, multimodal)
- Integrate knowledge and skills acquired from the Mason undergraduate experience, including Mason Core.
- Apply appropriate discipline/field/profession-specific competencies to an authentic problem or situation beyond the traditional classroom making connections from coursework in their program. Choose one of the following:
  - Demonstrate mastery within the field of study.
  - Apply creative critical thinking toward a solution.

#### **WESTERN CIVILIZATION/WORLD HISTORY**

**Learning Outcomes**: Courses must meet at least three of the five following outcomes.

- 1. Demonstrate familiarity with the major chronology of Western civilization or world history.
- Demonstrate the ability to narrate and explain long-term changes and continuities in Western civilization or world history.
- 3. Identify, evaluate, and appropriately cite online and print resources.
- 4. Develop multiple historical literacies by analyzing primary sources of various kinds (texts, images, music) and using these sources as evidence to support interpretation of historical events.
- Communicate effectively— through speech, writing, and use of digital media—their understanding of patterns, process, and themes in the history of Western civilization or the world.

Department	Course Number	Course Title
HIST	HIST 100	History of Western Civilization
HIST	HIST 125	Introduction to World History

**Required:** One approved course

#### Justification:

Currently most students take HIST 100 or HIST 125 to fulfill their general education requirement. The teaching and pedagogies of HIST 100 and 125 have become more aligned and should be merged into a single HIST 125 class that will focus on global perspectives of the past. Through the study of global history, students will gain an understanding of how modern systems of political, economic, and social meaning developed. By focusing on the diverse historical experiences that reflect the diverse backgrounds of Mason students, students will be able to see how the histories of their families and communities fit within, and contribute to, the larger story of the history of the modern world.


